Who We Are

The Kettering Education Foundation Advisory Board is an all-volunteer group, comprised of community leaders, former educators, and business associates. Additional input and advice is provided by a liaison with The Dayton Foundation, ex-officio members, and emeritus trustees. The Kettering Education Foundation (KEF) is a component fund of The Dayton Foundation.

We sponsor a competitive grant program through which Kettering classroom teachers are able to initiate creative projects to enhance learning for their students. On behalf of donors, KEF also manages scholarship funds that award several thousand dollars annually to graduating Kettering Fairmont High School seniors.

What We've Been Up To

KEF continues to fulfill our mission by awarding classroom grants to teachers and other Kettering City School (KCS) employees and presenting graduating seniors with scholarships. These grant and scholarship winners are listed on the following pages.

Since its inception, KEF has raised more than \$456,000 and has awarded more than 577 grants. Funds raised have helped KEF achieve its vision: to provide support for the Kettering School District's efforts to be an innovative leader in K-12 education throughout the Miami Valley.

During the 2023-2024 school year, KEF successfully transitioned our classroom grants awarded to teachers from a spring program to a fall program. KEF experienced more excitement from teachers during the fall season to develop and apply for classroom grants. Grant applications were received from the beginning of the school year until October. The grants were awarded in November of 2023. KEF and the Board of Education invited our awarded teachers to a special board meeting to recognize and celebrate the teachers for their winning ideas to make their classrooms and students better.

With leadership from Superintendent Mindy McCarty-Stewart, KEF met with the Kettering Forward Foundation. Kettering Forward Foundation is dedicated to supporting the growth of Kettering students, staff, families, and the schools through long-term partnerships. This new organization is working on goals different from KEF, but still interacts with the same Kettering students, staff, and community. Our boards had a productive meeting discussing our missions, goals, and limitations. Our main goal from the meeting is to work together in the Kettering Community to make Kettering the best it can be. KEF plans to meet annually with Kettering Forward Foundation to strengthen our relationship in our community but not lose the identity and mission of the KEF. In the spring of 2024, KEF and Kettering Forward Foundation were invited to present and share our missions with the Board of Education and Kettering City Council: KEF provides teacher grants for specific projects in classrooms and scholarships for graduating students whereas Kettering Forward Foundation provides building and equipment grants, maintains and grows the Fairmont alumni nation, and develops workforce immersion and training opportunities. Two nonprofit organizations, two boards, two missions, one community benefactor.

For the 2024-2025 school year, KEF was invited for the second year to the opening day kickoff meeting on August 12th. This gave the board an opportunity to mingle with the teachers and engage in the excitement for the new school year. Also, Superintendent McCarty-Stewart talked about KEF and our mission while celebrating the 2023-2024 grant winners. This was a special moment to spotlight the grant recipients and ignite the brainstorming process for the 2024-2025 grants.

The 2024-2025 Grant Applications are now open. The last day for teachers to submit their grant application is October 13th.

Andy Kremer and Ashley Miller, who both joined us in 2020 when we were searching for recent Fairmont graduates, have ended their terms on the KEF board. During our 2020 Strategic Plan, Andy participated on re-establishing our relationships with KCS stakeholders and getting the ball rolling with our presentations with the school board and the superintendent. Ashley participated on the marketing team to develop a branding guide. Thank you, Andy and Ashley, for your hard work and dedication to KEF.

New Scholarships

This year KEF managed twenty scholarships, including two new scholarships:

Joan B. DeLon National Honor Society Scholarship was established to honor the memory of Fairmont teacher and National Honor Society advisor, Joan DeLon, by recognizing an outstanding member of the National Honor Society. This scholarship was created by Joan's family: husband, Dick; daughter, Sue; and son, David. Joan was a well-respected English teacher who instilled pride in her students and her own children and grandchildren. At this year's senior recognition program, Sue DeLon presented the scholarship to senior Elisabeth McCall.

Candy Clark Scholarship was established by Candy Clark, a former art teacher in Kettering, to recognize an art student who has taken at least two years of art classes. Another well-respected teacher, Candy taught secondary art and advised the Art Club for 39 years. Candy presented her scholarship to senior Emily Engling at the spring program.

2023-2024 Grants

In the spring of 2023, the Kettering Education Foundation awarded teacher grants to 7 Kettering teachers for the 2023-2024 school year. Those grants were listed in the 2023 Annual Report, which was distributed in September. To make the grants more accessible, KEF moved the application and selection process to the fall. The following 25 grants were selected and implemented during the 2023-2024 school year:

Advanced Literary Reflections (RENEWAL)

Fairmont High School—Patricia Taylor

This grant provided challenging reading materials beyond the curriculum to meet the rigor demanded by 21st century skills, state standards, and AP standards, helping students increase their overall reading levels and benefiting them in all subject areas.

Representation Matters: Diverse and Culturally Responsive Books in the Classroom (RENEWAL)

Kettering Middle School—Katie Fitz

The primary goal of this grant was to increase student enjoyment of reading, in turn boosting academic achievement with improved comprehension and reading stamina. Funds were used to purchase additional books, specifically Wonderbooks with integrated audio players, allowing for students to listen to the book while they are reading.

Digital Literacy in the Classroom

Beavertown Elementary School—Sharon Cochran

Digital literacy is quickly becoming an important 21st century skill. Ozobot Evo is a small programmable robot to help students to develop coding and programming skills using a block-based coding language suitable for introducing digital literacy skills. Using Ozobot Evo, students can learn to think critically and solve problems.

Cooking for Life

Fairmont High School—Laura Heitz

This grant purchased cooking classes and utensils for Students in Transition, providing them with skills they will need when living on their own, including using knives, burners/oven, recipes, and kitchen safety. The four monthly classes included shopping for ingredients, food preparation, and clean up.

Making Connections to Standards (RENEWAL)

Indian Riffle Elementary School—Heather McManus

In addition to teaching academic standards, teachers have to incorporate social and emotional standards. Picture books are an excellent way for students to connect to the standards they are learning. By seeing the strategies through a story or illustrations, they can better comprehend the standards by making connections and applying them to real life situations. The teacher purchased additional books to support students, allowing them to grasp abstract concepts through visuals and controlled language.

Dayton Literary Peace Prize (RENEWAL)

Fairmont High School—Darren McGarvey

Each year Fairmont hosts a former Peace Prize author, inviting students from approximately ten local schools to join their International Baccalaureate students. The event is related to a prior winner of the Peace Prize, whose book and writing are shared with students through an interview and a question and answer session. The grant helped pay for the books and for the author's fees.

Empowering Tomorrow's Voices: Student Podcasting and Newscasting Studio

Kettering Middle School—Ali Reed

Through podcasting/newscasting, students can develop research, writing, presentation, and technical skills while exploring topics of personal and academic interest. This grant helped establish a fully equipped studio that will serve as a hub for creativity, collaboration, and learning. This studio can serve as a dynamic educational tool that not only improves instruction but also enriches the learning experience, involves stakeholders, strengthens community ties, and enhances the overall curriculum.

Enriching Minds with Mathematical Literacy

Greenmont Elementary School—Heather Cone

This project was designed to foster a deeper appreciation for mathematics, promote numeracy skills, and encourage a love of learning by providing students with engaging and accessible math-related books.

Empowering Readers: Building a Diverse and Engaging Classroom Library

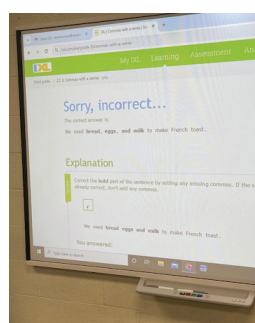
Fairmont High School—Erica Rogers

This grant allowed the classroom library to grow with diverse, high-interest books. When students get excited about reading and read more, they build fluency and test scores improve.

Social and Emotional Learning

Kettering Middle School—Mary Ellen Sage

KMS expanded its annual Play to Learn tournament into a quarterly event for 6th graders with competitions in their homerooms. This is a way to build community, utilizing Social and Emotional Learning strategies set forth by the State of Ohio, giving all students the chance to use their SEL skills while competing in games that all students, no matter their ability or language level, can play, reinforcing what they learned in their classrooms in a fun and engaging way.



IXL Intervention (RENEWAL)

Ascension—Amanda Lymburner

This grant renewed the subscription for the IXL program, which helps students close skill gaps in math and language arts. IXL is a continuous diagnostic that can be used throughout the year, suggesting specific areas and skills for each student to work on to increase their level, enabling the teacher to see student growth.

Recycling: Environmental Awareness *Kettering Middle School—Michelle Creech*

This grant funded a recycling program for students in the Alternate Setting Program at KMS. Students had the opportunity to develop important vocational skills and a sense of responsibility. The program was in collaboration with Rumpke, allowing the students to set up a recycling program for the school, encouraging environmental awareness, developing vocational skills, and fostering collaboration within a community.

2023-2024 Grants

Improving on the Biology End of Course Exam

Fairmont High School—Emily Newman

This grant enables biology teachers at Fairmont to improve and add to dissection inquiry labs, allowing teachers to buy supplies to create and expose students to a comparative fish anatomy lab. All of these supplies will be able to be reused and shared by all biology teachers for many years as the fish samples are preserved and students will not be dissecting these specimens, only making comparisons of structures unique to the three main groups of fish species. Comparative anatomy labs and animal dissections help students experience and observe biochemistry, cell structure and function, and all the processes and chemical reactions of life, topics that students need to be successful on their state exam.

Jump Rope

John F. Kennedy Elementary School—Dan Palmer

This grant allowed the teacher to purchase jump ropes for 3rd graders to incorporate exercise into their weekly instruction. Students recorded their progress on a chart kept in the classroom and had the jump rope to take home at the end of the school year.

EduLastic

Van Buren Middle School—Tynetta Schaffer

EduLastic is an online platform that will supplement current materials to help teach the Ohio New Learning Standards in math. This program allows teachers to intervene, remediate, and enrich students with online lessons while providing students with opportunities to improve their 21st century technological skills. The program also provides immediate feedback to guide the students.

Invention Convention (RENEWAL)

Multiple Schools—Casey McBride

This grant purchased consumable materials for presentation boards and prototypes to be used with students completing the Invention Convention, a program that gives students an opportunity to work on problem-solving, critical thinking, creative thinking, communication, and engineering skills.

Prismacolor

Fairmont High School—Carlee Bollin

Art students use Prismacolor pencils to create works of high caliber in drawing and painting and AP Art courses. Having access to these pencils enhances their experience and end product. This grant purchased colored pencils, enabling the teacher to keep packs at school but also have enough to loan out packs for students to use at home.

Push the Pedals

Indian Riffle Elementary School—Melissa Chrisman

With the purchase of some tricycles, preschoolers had the opportunity to “push the pedals” with their feet so they can learn to ride a tricycle. Participating in physical activities and learning to pedal a tricycle are included in the Early Learning Development Standards.

Global Read Aloud (RENEWAL)

Southdale Elementary School—Karen Kronour

Global Read Aloud is a program where children connect with other students all over the world by reading the same book at the same time. The books focus on diverse topics and help students focus on their social and emotional needs, a national standard for gifted children. The grant provided funds to purchase books and do extensions to allow the teachers to continue to use the program as a way to serve students identified as gifted in superior cognitive ability or reading during their pull-out sessions.

I Survived

Orchard Park Elementary School—Rebecca Kinney

The *I Survived* books purchased with funding from this grant will supplement the curriculum and help students better understand the Revolutionary War and the build-up to the Civil War, meeting two of the social studies standards. This applies to the standards of understanding the heritage of the United States and how the thirteen colonies came together around a common cause of liberty and justice, uniting to fight for independence during the American Revolution and the continued movement to abolish slavery, ultimately leading to the Civil War.

Greenspace and Enhancing the Learning Experience

Fairmont High School—Molly Merrill

This grant purchased supplies to create an outdoor classroom, a versatile space for students to study, relax, collaborate, and seek support in connection with nature. Greenspace has consistently been associated with improved mental health, including reductions in depressive symptoms, behavioral issues, inattention, and hyperactivity. Spending time outdoors can enhance creativity, concentration, engagement, and overall academic performance.

Meet the Medieval Peasant

Van Buren Middle School—Beth Hageman

Via the magic of time travel, the seventh graders “met” a medieval peasant living in the 1430s in rural England, learning about his life. The students and teacher directed the discussion through their questions. The peasant answered questions about weapons, hand farm tools, sporting equipment, musical instruments, coins, etc. This presentation relates directly to learning standards for social studies.

Secret Stories

Oakview Elementary School—Carly Maguire

Secret Stories is a brain-based approach to traditional phonics instruction that accelerates learner access to the reading and writing code, aiding in students’ ability to decode, segment, and blend words. This grant was used to purchase the Secret Stories for the first grade classrooms, allowing teachers to enhance their reading instruction to make the learning approachable and engaging for all learners.

STEAM Manipulatives

Greenmont Elementary School—Deb McClure and Marlina McKenzie

This grant was used to purchase materials needed for second grade STEAM lessons to support the academic curriculum of reading, math, and science as well as lifelong learning, collaboration, and critical thinking. Using the engineering process, students were provided STEAM challenges to solve real world problems.

One School One Book

Orchard Park Elementary School—Amanda Wagner

This is a multi-week, school-wide reading event where students and their families, faculty, and staff read the same book together. Students explored the book with their peers and teachers through assemblies, trivia, skits, vocabulary, and STEAM projects, increasing family and community involvement and allowing all students to have access to books at home.

Kettering Education Foundation Scholarship Awards

The Kettering Education Foundation (KEF), a component fund of The Dayton Foundation, offers numerous scholarships on a yearly basis. On May 16, 2024, KEF, on behalf of its donors, presented 20 scholarships to 23 outstanding Kettering Fairmont graduates. A summary of all scholarship awards and the 2024 recipients follows:

Jeff Guernsey Memorial Scholarship

Jeff Guernsey was the guy who would give you the shirt off his back and would always be there to help when someone was in need. Known as the class clown of the department, Jeff was a firefighter for the Washington Township Fire Department for 30 years, a lieutenant in charge of the department's honor guard. Jeff passed away in December 2020 after battling complications from COVID-19. This scholarship was established to help students further their education in a fire-related field.

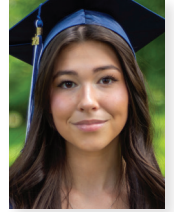


Diane Patterson Memorial Scholarship

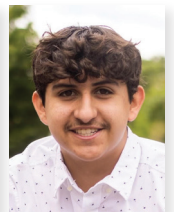


Fairmont Men's Soccer Brotherhood Scholarship

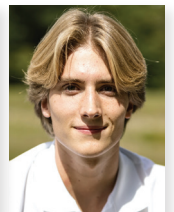


Chief's Scholarship

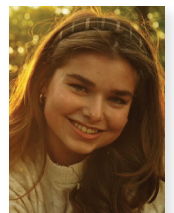


Joan B. DeLon National Honor Society Scholarship
